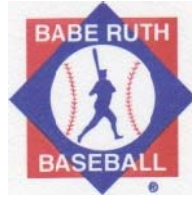

## BORDER CROSSING REQUIREMENTS

### By Land

As of January 31, 2008, **all travelers** must present documents to enter U.S./Canada. These documents must be:

- a valid passport; or
- a government-issued photo ID, such as a driver's license, **PLUS** a birth certificate or citizenship card; or
- a NEXUS or a Free and Secure Trade (fast) card; or
- an enhanced driver's license; or
- a Certificate of Indian Status (CIS) card; or
- **for those 18 and under, only a birth certificate.**

### By Air

**Canadian citizens** traveling by air to, through or from the United States must present one of the following documents:

- a valid Canadian passport; or
- a valid NEXUS card when used at participating airports.

**This requirement applies to all travelers, regardless of age, including children.**

**U.S. citizens** traveling to Canada are required to show U.S. Government-issued photo ID and proof of U.S. citizenship, such as a birth certificate. In addition, U.S. law requires that Americans entering the U.S. from Canada by air (including those returning by air from short trips to Canada) must have a valid passport.

(Canadians driving across the International border, flying from one U.S. city to another U.S. city do not require passports when boarding the plane.)

### Crossing the Canadian / U.S. Border with Children

**U.S. and Canadian citizens** ages 15 or younger with parental consent will be allowed to cross the borders at land entry points with original or certified copies of their birth certificates rather than passports.

**U.S. and Canadian** citizens ages 16 through 18 traveling with an athletic group and under adult supervision will also be allowed to travel with only their birth certificates.

**Note: For Children traveling without Both Parents:**

Adults traveling over the border into the U.S. and/or Canada with children who are not their own should have a written note from the parent or guardian giving permission for the children to leave the country. The permission should include the name and contact information of the parent/guardian.
